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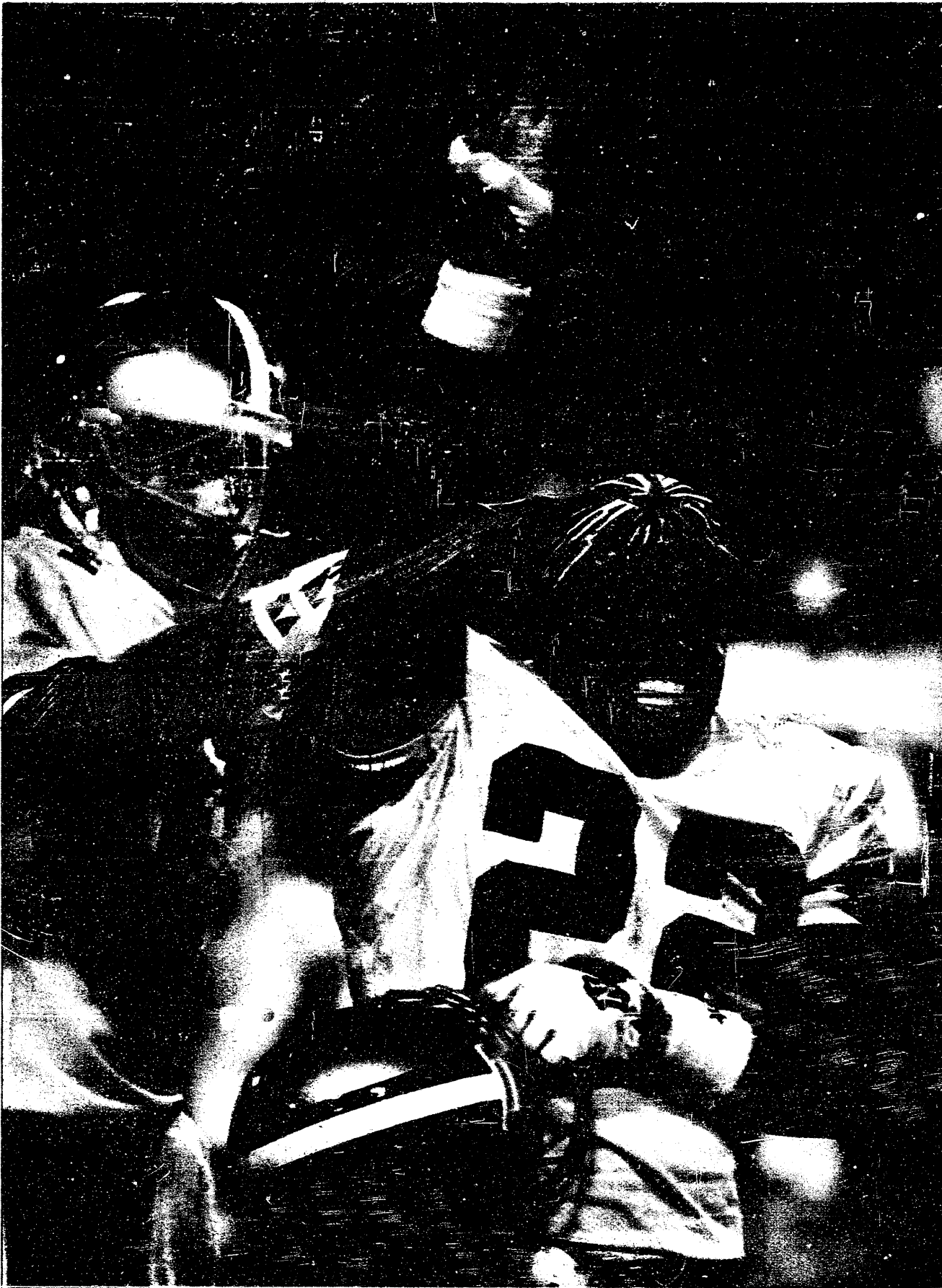

## Cowboys fend off Steelers, 27-17, to win Super Bowl for 3rd time in four years

**T**EMPE, Ariz. — Place the stamp on the Cowboys as the NFL's Team of the Decade. Emmitt Smith rushed for two touchdowns, and Troy Aikman passed for another score Sunday as the Cowboys became the first team in National Football League history to win three Super Bowls in a span of four years, with a 27-17 victory over the Pittsburgh Steelers.

The Cowboys tied the San Francisco 49ers, the Team of the 1980s, with a record fifth Super Bowl title and also became the first team to win them with three coaches — Tom Landry, Jimmy Johnson and now Barry Switzer.

"I want to thank Coach Landry, I want to thank Jimmy, I want to thank Barry," said Jerry Jones, who captured the third Super Bowl of his seven years as owner.

But Jones never made a greater commitment to winning than he did in 1995. He spent \$15 million more than any other NFL team this season and almost double that of the American Football Conference champion Steelers. His expensive and talented cast of stars, many of whose names are as well-known on Madison Avenue as they are on Mockingbird Lane, returned the Lombardi Trophy to Dallas after a one-year absence.

All of his marquee players delivered championship performances in the Super Bowl as Aikman, Smith, Deion Sanders and Michael Irvin played key roles against the Steelers.

But it was Dallas salary-cap lightweight Larry Brown, who made only \$500,200 this season to play the cornerback opposite Sanders, that made the two key plays that sent the AFC down to its 12th consecutive Super Bowl defeat.

## Ethiopian Jews clash with Israeli police

Immigrants protest dumping of donated blood; health officials had feared HIV contamination

**JERUSALEM** — Thousands of Ethiopian Jews clashed with riot police Sunday in a protest over the disclosure that blood they donated was secretly dumped for fear that it was contaminated with the AIDS virus.

Israeli officials have said the blood was accepted from Ethiopians and surreptitiously thrown out so donors would not be publicly stigmatized. But the realization that their blood was rejected seemed to unleash a sense of humiliation and discrimination among Israel's 60,000 Ethiopian Jews, an ancient branch of the Jewish people who were brought to Israel in airlifts in 1984-85 and 1991.

"Our blood is as red as yours, and we are just as Jewish as you are," proclaimed one of many banners in a throng of about 10,000 black Jews.

"Apartheid in Israel," another proclaimed. Vastly outnumbered by the demonstrators, the police

## Du Pont heir captured after 48-hour standoff

Murder suspect had stepped outside to fix boilers

**NEWTOWN SQUARE, Pa.** — Saying he was cold and wanted to repair the boilers that heat his home, John E. du Pont walked out of his house after a 48-hour standoff Sunday and was arrested by SWAT team members, police said.

He was charged later with first-degree murder in Friday's slaying of former Olympic wrestling champion David Schultz and was ordered held without bail in a county prison.

Delaware County District Attorney Patrick Meehan said he had not decided whether to seek the death penalty.

The boilers were shut off Friday night by police officers when they

restored phone service to the house of Mr. du Pont, the 57-year-old chemical company heir and a wrestling benefactor.

Mr. du Pont apparently felt cold after a weekend of frigid temperatures and thought the boilers were broken, so he walked out of the home about 2 p.m. Dallas time and headed toward a greenhouse, where a tunnel entrance leads to the heating system, law enforcement officials said.

When the police realized that Mr. du Pont was unarmed, they moved from the surrounding woods and walked toward him to make an arrest, Mr. Meehan said. Please see DU PONT on 12A.
